
KP Care is Education

The pedagogy of care dissolves the false dichotomy that there is a difference between education and care. In the past, caring was viewed as a minimum standard of keeping a child safe and clean, or as something anyone could do. In the emerging future, caring is viewed as an intelligence and an intentional teaching practice that connects us to one another and requires specialized knowledge about children, learning, and human development.



Looking at our work through the lens of care ethics allows us to claim and celebrate our unique identity as early childhood professionals. We who work with babies, toddlers, and our youngest children, have a spectacular front-row seat at the beginning of life. The nucleus of care offers us a unique opportunity to adopt a pedagogy of love and care as the serious, sturdy foundation for nurturing a flourishing life. In this session, the author of a groundbreaking new book, "Illuminating Care," will engage audiences in a provocative conversation that explores the language of care; the historical and contextual roots of care work; care ethics, and how to weave them into our own work and lives; and, strategies for joining and celebrating the growing care movement.

Participants will leave with a renewed sense of identity and practical strategies for valuing, naming and practicing a care pedagogy. One of the exciting applications of "Illuminating Care" is to recognize the regenerative and reciprocal nature of care, and to include ourselves in the caring equation. Using care ethics as a pillar of our work leads us back to our purpose, our priorities, and ultimately our joy.
