Core Knowledge Categories

Designed to help attendees to select trainings that contribute to their acquisition of a well-rounded body of knowledge and move to desired steps on the Oregon Registry. Each session description lists one or more of the following core knowledge categories:

DIV Diversity

Knowledge of differences in race, gender, ability, age, language, family composition, culture, ethnicity, socio-economic status, and/or religion. Weaving anti-bias awareness throughout all program activities and learning environments for children and youth.

FCS Families and Community Systems

Knowledge of the complex characteristics of children's families and communities. Establishing respectful relationships and communication with family and community members.

HSN Health, Safety and Nutrition

Knowledge of basic health, safety, and nutrition principles and practices. Knowledge of child abuse and neglect prevention, identification, reporting procedures, and therapeutic care. Promoting healthy choices and safety awareness with children and youth.

HGD Human Growth and Development

Knowledge of social, emotional, cognitive and physical growth and development. Using developmentally appropriate practices and principles in programs for children and youth.

LEC Learning Environments and Curriculum

Knowledge of the relationship between physical space, activities, experiences, and materials with child behavior, growth and development. Creating developmentally appropriate and culturally appropriate learning environments and curricula to foster optimum growth and development of children and youth.

O&A Observation and Assessment

Knowledge of observation techniques, assessment tools, and documentation procedures for children and youth. Using observation and assessment to individualize learning experiences, improve the effectiveness of the learning environment, and support referrals for specialized services.

PPLD Personal, Professional and Leadership Devel. Knowledge of childhood care and education as a profession with an identified body of knowledge, professional standards, professional ethics, and established systems. Participating in leadership, advocacy, personal growth, and professional development activities.

PM Program Management

Knowledge of accepted business practices, legal and regulatory requirements, financial obligations, and record keeping. Developing or implementing program policies, communication strategies, management plans, and sound financial practices.

SN Special Needs


Knowledge of disabilities and other special needs, related resources, and regulations/laws. Implementing an inclusive and sensitive practice with children and youth in partnership with families.

UGB Understanding and Guiding Behavior

Knowledge of developmentally appropriate and culturally appropriate guidance theories, principles and practices. Providing positive guidance to foster self-esteem, self-regulation, constructive behavior, and positive relationships for children and youth.

KP Care is Education

The pedagogy of care dissolves the false dichotomy that there is a difference between education and care. In the past, caring was viewed as a minimum standard of keeping a child safe and clean, or as something anyone could do. In the emerging future, caring is viewed as an intelligence and an intentional teaching practice that connects us to one another and requires specialized knowledge about children, learning, and human development.



Looking at our work through the lens of care ethics allows us to claim and celebrate our unique identity as early childhood professionals. We who work with babies, toddlers, and our youngest children, have a spectacular front-row seat at the beginning of life. The nucleus of care offers us a unique opportunity to adopt a pedagogy of love and care as the serious, sturdy foundation for nurturing a flourishing life. In this session, the author of a groundbreaking new book, "Illuminating Care," will engage audiences in a provocative conversation that explores the language of care; the historical and contextual roots of care work; care ethics, and how to weave them into our own work and lives; and, strategies for joining and celebrating the growing care movement.

Participants will leave with a renewed sense of identity and practical strategies for valuing, naming and practicing a care pedagogy. One of the exciting applications of "Illuminating Care" is to recognize the regenerative and reciprocal nature of care, and to include ourselves in the caring equation. Using care ethics as a pillar of our work leads us back to our purpose, our priorities, and ultimately our joy.

Carol Garboden Murray, M.Ed.

Director, Wimpfheimer Laboratory Nursery School at Vassar College, Poughkeepsie, New York

Carol Garboden Murray has been working with children, families, and teachers for many years in Oregon, Texas, Florida, Massachusetts, and New York State. She says, "A life working in early education and care has been more intellectually stimulating, heartfelt, rewarding, challenging, and wildly creative than I could have ever dreamed. I am honored to care for the children in our communities and I am grateful for all the people who have helped me tell the story of care in this book."



AM1 Beyond the Job Chart: Clean up Time and Cultures of Caring

Carol Garboden Murray, M.Ed. Author of Illuminating Care: *The Pedagogy and Practice of Care in Early Childhood Communities*

In this workshop, we will discuss the meaningful ways to create a curriculum of care and a culture of belonging in preschool. We will examine some of the intrinsic problems inherent with traditional job charts in preschool. Moving beyond the job chart, caring becomes an authentic expression and a way of life in classrooms that makes caring rituals a part of the pedagogy. With a new way of viewing care, we will design empowering participation, we will model care, we will learn what children care about, and we will give children authentic opportunities to care for themselves and one another. *SET ONE / LEC / 3-5*

AM2 Building Literacy Skills With Bilingual Children

Rosalinda Duran, Kindergarten Teacher Jewett Elementary School, TWI Program

This session will provide multiple ideas applied in a TWI (Two Way Immersion) classroom focused on primary grades. I will share different engaging and hands-on literacy activities that promote reading and writing skills. I will model a variety of fun activities that promote language development and language acquisition. We will practice together different strategies such as games, songs, and movement activities I use in the classroom to give students the opportunity to process and apply learning in different ways. *SET TWO / LEC / 5-8*

AM3 An Introduction to ASD and Evidence-Based Practices to Support Inclusion

Darcy Larson, EI/ECSE Program Administrator & Janae Emerson, ECSE Specialist Jackson County EI/ECSE

This session will dive into the basics of autism spectrum disorder and provide the listener with an idea of what evidence-based practices can be used within an inclusive classroom setting. It will explore characteristics of autism, accommodation and modification strategies to meet individual learning needs, and a basic overview of inclusion with regards to exceptionalities in the classroom. *SET ONE / SN / 3-5*

AM4 Playing to Learn: Integrating Play for Student Success

Join us for an exploration into the powerful fusion of play and student success. This session delves into the strategic integration of play planning and purpose-built studios that merge academics and play to foster effective learning. By embracing the innate curiosity and creativity of children, educators and parents alike can discover innovative approaches to foster growth. Through carefully designed play planning techniques and the development of dedicated learning studios, attendees will uncover how to: Foster connections between play and Learning, create purposeful Learning spaces and utilize students' innate curiosities. AM6 Understanding Adverse Childhood Experiences

Vital information on how our brains and nervous systems develop, how we pass down traits from one generation to the next through the expression of our DNA, on the game-changing ACEs (Adverse Childhood Experiences) study that shows the root causes of health challenges, mental health challenges and behavior health challenges, and on the specific tools we can use to build resilience---the ability to positively adapt to whatever life brings us--for our kids, families and communities. *SET SET TWO / HSN / All Ages*

AM7 Art Invitations for Preschoolers

Design art projects for your classroom that support development and are both process and product oriented. AM9 Conscious Discipline: "Why Can't We All Just Get Along?"

All behavior is communication. When we can better understand the message that behavior is sending, we can help meet the need. In this session, we will gain clarity about the Conscious Discipline Brain State Model and how it helps us teach missing skills and support children in navigating the complex social climate of group care. We will focus on the skill of positive intent so we can help even the most aggressive child learn how to get their needs met in more appropriate ways. We will also practice skills to help children who often become victims use their BIG voice and set boundaries as they learn to advocate for themselves. *Set ONE / UGB / All Ages*

PM1 Reclaiming Love in Early Education and Care

Why have we been afraid to talk about love as a vital component of early education and care? How do we make sense of the love we feel for the children in our care? What is professional love? What about if we find some children less loveable? Join author Carol Garboden Murray for a discussion that seeks to define love, question love, and analyze love as we legitimize love in early education and care. We will examine love as it relates to child identity, belonging, and secure attachments. We will also discuss heartache, grief, and emotional labor. Love is a key component in honoring, witnessing, and caring for young children. Naming love as part of our professional practice brings depth and strength to caregiving relationships. *SET ONE / HGD / All Ages*

PM2 Inclusion & Accessibility: What Does this Really Mean for Children Receiving

Language Supports?

Learn what inclusive practices can offer when working with bilingual children experiencing challenging behaviors, and with an identified learning disability in language development. Focusing on native Spanish speaking children, participants will learn the benefits of an identified language deficit and what the specific supports an Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) can mean when learning among peers in a classroom. *SET TWO / SN / 0-3*

PM3 Children's Behaviors as Communication and Local Mental Health Supports

En el futuro emergente, el cuidado se ve como una inteligencia y una práctica de enseñanza intencional que nos conecta unos con otros y requiere conocimientos especializados sobre los niños, el aprendizaje y el desarrollo humano.

Mirar nuestro trabajo a través del lente de la ética del cuidado nos permite reclamar y celebrar nuestra identidad única como profesionales de la primera infancia. Quienes trabajamos con bebés, toddlers, y nuestros niños pequeños, tenemos un espectacular asiento en primera fila al comienzo de la vida. 


Jackson County EI/ECSE, a program of Douglas ESD

The Early Intervention (EI) Program provides services to children with disabilities from birth up to three years of age throughout Jackson County.

The Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) Program provides services to children with disabilities from age three to kindergarten throughout Jackson County. Both El and ECSE programs (EI/ECSE) are administered through Douglas County Education Services District (ESD). The ESD employs teachers, speech therapists, occupational therapists, physical therapists and integration specialists to provide a full range of services to these children. ESD staff work closely with the following agencies in providing these services: Southern Oregon Regional Program, physicians, preschools, Southern Oregon Head Start, Early Head Start, Family Nurturing Center, Jackson County Mental Health, Cacoon, Jackson County Developmental Disability Services, local school districts, Oregon Child Development Coalition, Southern Oregon Early Learning Services (early learning hub), and others.
