


Training Hours

Core Knowledge Categories

Designed to help attendees to select trainings that contribute to their acquisition of a well-rounded body of knowledge and move to desired steps on the Oregon Registry. Each session description lists one or more of the following core knowledge categories:

DIV Diversity

Knowledge of differences in race, gender, ability, age, language, family composition, culture, ethnicity, socio-economic status, and/or religion. Weaving anti-bias awareness throughout all program activities and learning environments for children and youth.

FCS Families and Community Systems

Knowledge of the complex characteristics of children's families and communities. Establishing respectful relationships and communication with family and community members.

HSN Health, Safety and Nutrition

Knowledge of basic health, safety, and nutrition principles and practices. Knowledge of child abuse and neglect prevention, identification, reporting procedures, and therapeutic care. Promoting healthy choices and safety awareness with children and youth.

HGD Human Growth and Development

Knowledge of social, emotional, cognitive and physical growth and development. Using developmentally appropriate practices and principles in programs for children and youth.

LEC Learning Environments and Curriculum

Knowledge of the relationship between physical space, activities, experiences, and materials with child behavior, growth and development. Creating developmentally appropriate and culturally appropriate learning environments and curricula to foster optimum growth and development of children and youth.

O&A Observation and Assessment

Knowledge of observation techniques, assessment tools, and documentation procedures for children and youth. Using observation and assessment to individualize learning experiences, improve the effectiveness of the learning environment, and support referrals for specialized services.

PPLD Personal, Professional and Leadership Devel.

Knowledge of childhood care and education as a profession with an identified body of knowledge, professional standards, professional ethics, and established systems. Participating in leadership, advocacy, personal growth, and professional development activities.

PM Program Management

Knowledge of accepted business practices, legal and regulatory requirements, financial obligations, and record keeping. Developing or implementing program policies, communication strategies, management plans, and sound financial practices.

SN Special Needs


Knowledge of disabilities and other special needs, related resources, and regulations/laws. Implementing an inclusive and sensitive practice with children and youth in partnership with families.

UGB Understanding and Guiding Behavior

Knowledge of developmentally appropriate and culturally appropriate guidance theories, principles and practices. Providing positive guidance to foster self-esteem, self-regulation, constructive behavior, and positive relationships for children and youth.

KP Educating Citizens Through Play

Teacher Tom speaks about how children's play brings the habits and principles of democracy into 'early years' classrooms. He'll start by discussing the purpose of education in democratic societies and how and why we have managed to veer so far from the original intent, which is to educate citizens capable of contributing to the grand experiment of self-governance.



In this full-throated support for play-based education, he details through his illustrative classroom stories and examples exactly how his curriculum works. Participants will learn the benefits of introducing these playful principles to their own students, the hallmarks of what makes a good citizen both in a classroom as well as a democracy, the traits and habits required for self-governance, and practical tips on how to implement these ideas in their own classrooms. It is an inspiring, often touching, often hilarious, and always eye-opening and empowering presentation.

Tom "Teacher Tom" Hobson

Teacher Tom's World. Co-Founder

Tom "Teacher Tom" Hobson is an early childhood educator, international speaker, education consultant, teacher of teachers, parent educator, and author. He's best known, however, for Teacher Tom's Blog, where he has posted daily since 2009, chronicling the life and times of his little preschool in the rainsoaked Pacific Northwest corner of the USA.



Today, Teacher Tom shares his play-based pedagogy through online courses for early childhood educators; produces online early childhood conferences; consults with organizations about his "Family Schools" program; and inspires early years audiences around the world and across the US, both virtually and in-person with his engaging views on early childhood education, play, and pedagogy. He also hosts Teacher Tom's Podcast. He was pressured by his blog readers into authoring his first book, aptly named Teacher Tom's First Book, and subsequently Teacher Tom's Second Book.

AM1 Risky Play

Teacher Tom Hobson, Co-Founder, Teacher Tom's World

It's impossible to talk about play without addressing "risky play." Physical, intellectual, and social-emotional risk-taking are a central aspect for preschoolers learning through play. Yet our increasing litigiousness, a culture of "helicopter parenting," and our mainstream broadly held perception of children as incapable, make risky play...well, risky. In this session, Teacher Tom shares research and anecdotes to define risky play (with an emphasis on physical risk taking), why it is important, and how educators can support risk-taking in their settings. Participants will come away with a framework for thinking about the role risk can, and should, play within the healthy development process of young children. SET ONE / HGD / 3-5

AM2 Learning from Nature

Melissa Moore, Director, Freckled Fawn Nature School

Step outside and discover what nature has to offer. In this session we will explore unstructured outdoor play, its benefits to our children, how to incorporate it in any setting, how we can use nature as a guide to prepare our children for academic learning, and ultimately setting them up for success in the grade school years.

This session is designed to equip educators with effective, adaptable strategies that support every child in the early learning environment. Participants will explore practical tools and inclusive practices that foster a sense of belonging, enhance engagement, and address diverse learning needs. Through hands-on examples and collaborative discussions, educators will gain insights into universal supports that can be seamlessly integrated into any early childhood classroom to promote positive outcomes for all learners. AM6 Lines, Squiggles, and Circles: Examining Children's Art and Mark Making as a Gateway to Learning

Participants will examine the pictorial evolution of children's art and mark making using Rhoda Kellog's theory, reflect on the young child's anatomy and impact of misinformed agendas that push early formal writing, examine and create materials that can encourage children's mark making, examine mark making as a legitimate form of communication in children. AM7 Mindful Supervision: Child Safety and Injury Prevention

Alyssa Geoffrey, Project Specialist for CCSO, The Research Institute

Join us for an engaging training session on the most common accidents, injuries, and safety incidents across different age groups. Learn how to effectively report injuries, navigate required processes and documentation, and master facility-specific safety protocols and emergency preparedness. AM8 And the EYES have it! Vision is More than 20/20

Dr. Eric Dukes, Doctor of Optometry, Progressive Optometry, Inc.

In this session Dr. Dukes will bring his years of experience and expertise working with young children primarily with compromised visual abilities. Visual abilities are comprised of several individual skills; eye movements, eye teaming, accommodation (focus), 20/20 acuity, visual perception, eye-hand coordination and visual imagery. Poor visual skills tax the rest of the body thereby decreasing reading comprehension and retention, while causing fatigue, poor attention and lack of interest. Become more informed about vision in children, including conditions that are not always obvious, and the importance of developmentally appropriate expectations in our practices. AM9 Exploring the Spectrum: Insights into Autism for Early Childhood Educators

Sarah Razzano, Board Certified Behavior Analyst and Autism Specialist, Southern Oregon ABA

Let's explore the spectrum together and find ways to include and engage our learners who have Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). This workshop is for early childhood professionals and caregivers to gain a better understanding of ASD. Participants will explore concepts including early signs, screening, assessment and eligibility and hear voices from professionals and parents in the field. Common and helpful supports and evidence based practices will be shared along with positive behavior supports. At its core, a play-based early childhood curriculum is about supporting the children as they construct their own learning by asking their own questions, then having the time and space to pursue their own answers within the context of the community. In this workshop, Teacher Tom brings the principles of play-based learning to adult professional development. We will, together, construct our own learning based upon the questions that each of us bring to our "circle time." Teacher Tom will facilitate our explorations in the same sort of freeform manner he employs in working with the young children he teaches, interspersing discussion with songs and stories. PM₂ **Exploring Adverse Childhood Experiences**

PM3 Making Sense of the Senses: Examining 8 Senses and Strategies to Help **Children Navigate Their World**

Participants will examine 8 human senses, how they work together, and develop strategies to help children with sensory processing and heavy work. We will also examine the value of working together with therapists and families. SET TWO / SN / All Ages

PM4 Forget Me Not Documentary Showing with Q & A

Join us for a special screening of Forget Me Not, a powerful documentary that explores the journey of one family navigating the public education system in pursuit of inclusive education for their child with Down syndrome. The film sheds light on the challenges and triumphs of advocating for inclusive classrooms and equitable opportunities for children with disabilities. Following the screening, we will host an interactive Q&A session to discuss the film's themes, share insights on inclusive education, and explore ways to advocate for systemic change in our own communities. This session is an opportunity for families, educators, and advocates to engage in meaningful dialogue about inclusion and the impact of advocacy on creating more accessible learning environments for all children. PM5 **Exploring Autism and the Relationship to Learning and Success**

The training will provide practical strategies when working with preschool children who experience autism. Securely attached children tend to have better emotional regulation, higher self-esteem, greater resilience, and more fulfilling relationships, as well as improved social skills, academic success, and overall well-being. 



The Early Intervention (EI) Program provides services to children with disabilities from

The Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) Program provides services to children with disabilities from age three to kindergarten throughout Jackson County. Both EI and ECSE programs (EI/ECSE) are administered through Douglas County Education Services District (ESD). The ESD employs teachers, speech therapists, occupational therapists, physical therapists and integration specialists to provide a full range of services to these children. ESD staff work closely with the following agencies in providing these services: Southern Oregon Regional Program, physicians, preschools, Southern Oregon Head Start, Early Head Start, Family Nurturing Center, Jackson County Mental Health, Cacoon, Jackson County Developmental Disability Services, local school districts, Oregon Child Development Coalition, Southern Oregon Early Learning Services (early learning hub), and others.
